## Principal Update – Melissa Mackenzie


This is the last newsletter for the term and as I reflect on the fast pace of this term, I realise how much we have fit into the 9 weeks and how much learning our amazing students have done. Here is a summary of all that has happened since 26 April: the annual APS Fun Run which led to some year 3-6 students competing in District, Divisional and then Regional cross-country events. The year 6 students competed in the Interschool Sporting Program throughout the term with the Netball teams making the grand final. We experienced many incursions and excursions: a VR Solar System for year 3; Science works for the year 3's; 'Push and Pull forces for the year 2's; Bundoora Farm for the year 4's; Prep and Year 1 visit to Werribee zoo; Author Trent Roberts presenting to the year 4,5 and 6; and Mad About Science for years 5 and 6. Our preps also had community visitors from the police, the fire brigade, paramedics and Responsible Pet Ownership.

We acknowledged Reconciliation Week and Sorry Day and we celebrated everything STEM with an open afternoon. We also opened our classroom doors for Education Week and the leaders organized a House Event for the end of term. We launched the Bully Stoppers program with all classes recognizing what bullying is. I have attached a photo of one of the displays to support you with conversations at home.




The staff continued their work on the Pre-Review Self Evaluation; completed Anaphylaxis training; completed two inquiry cycles into the teaching of reading and writing; continued the implementation of SMART spelling and wrote the semester reports which involved moderation meetings in reading, writing and math.

All in all, the opportunities we create and the learning that is generated from all that we offer makes APS a great place to be. Our data supports this with the release of the 2022 Supplementary School level report which compares 'similar' schools to APS with teacher judgements, NAPLAN and student absences. In every measure we perform better than 'similar' schools.

## Assistant Principal Update – Shane Wilkie

As we come to the end of term two for 2023 it is great to reflect on another wonderful term of school achievements at APS. The STEM Expo was a particular highlight, with great community attendance again. The growth and maturity of our Prep students this term has been phenomenal as they really engage in school life. The success at the various levels of cross country was outstanding, with APS taking first and second in the boys and girls district event. While several students were selected to attend Division, the Regional and we have 5 students heading off to State trials next term.



Interschool Sport Grand Finals – I would like to acknowledge the amazing efforts of the Girls Netball teams. Both advanced to play in the Grand Finals of Interschool Sports competition, held last Friday at Narrandjeri Sports Complex. I was so proud to have been involved as coach for both teams this season. We knew that they were going to be extremely tough games.

The A team took on the very strong St Anthony's team in the final; the only team to defeat us during the regular season. The girls played extremely well holding the score close all the way up until three quarter time. In the final quarter they were just too strong and pulled ahead to victory. Congratulations to the girls for their efforts. We had a goal of making it through to the top 4 at the start of the season and they achieved and exceeded this.

The B team versed the Mixed Mary Immaculate team, and while they persevered for the entire match, MIPS were just too strong, particularly their shooters whose basketball background came to the fore.

The entire group of B team girls had never played an official competitive game of netball prior to the start of the season, so to make it all the way to the grand final is something they should be super proud of.

<u>Safety in the playground –</u> We are continually reviewing and monitoring the play of students in the yard at school. With the completion of the building upgrades and the additional play space at the southern end of the school, and the continued utilisation of Alphington Park, we are adequately able to space students throughout the yard. In saying this, the main turf is still an area where multiple ball games require all students and staff to be alert. Students have been involved in establishing safe protocols for using the turf area and have spoken on assembly about these. We monitor this area regularly and remind students to follow these protocols.

From 8:30am until 9:00am there should be no active ball games being held on the turf. The area is a high traffic area with younger children accompanying their families on the walk to school. Staff on duty will stop students playing games during this time.

Finally, the teacher on duty from 3:30pm will ask that students do not play active ball games on the turf while people are transiting through this area. From 3:45pm students are unsupervised by staff if your child is participating in activities on school grounds, please ensure your children are being safe.

<u>Traffic Safety</u> – In recent weeks we have had several reports of traffic incidents involving our students and families on the roads around the school, including on some of the main intersections at Chandler Highway, Heidelberg Road, and the Alphington Station crossing. If your child is travelling either as a cyclist or pedestrian at these major intersections, please speak to them and remind them of road safe habits.

While some of these incidents have happened further from the school grounds, there have been a number directly outside of the school. Can I please ask families to utilise the crossing on Yarralea Street rather than crossing directly from the laneway from Alphington Park. It is an almost daily occurrence to see students stepping out between parked cars to cross the road as opposed to walking down to the open space of the pedestrian crossing.

**Report Cards: REMINDER** Semester One Reports were published via Compass on Friday 16 June. An electronic copy of your child's report is available for you to view online now and download as required from Compass. If you wish to receive a hard copy of the report, please contact your child's class teacher. So far less than half of the reports have been accessed.

We recommend families sharing the report with their child, celebrating their achievements, and positively discussing the next learning steps. If you have any questions regarding your child's report, please do not hesitate to contact your child's teacher.

## Year 6 Cyberbullying Presentation

On Friday the 9th of June the Year Sixes presented their learning from the Bully Stoppers program. The presentation was a skit where one of the main characters, Mahir, was confused about how cyberbullying works. His friend, David, helps him to understand by showing him the definition of cyberbullying presented by Lucinda and Mali – *'Using digital devices, sites and Apps to intimidate, harm and upset someone else.'* Mahir then starts to understand. David shows Mahir an example of the work that the year sixes have done presented by Miles, Bass, Ted, Stella and Annabel. This was in the form of a short play where the main character, Sandra, was a victim of cyber bullying by her friends Jack & Maya, who were angry when they were not invited to Sandra's party. This helped Mahir understand further.


## Check-ups start on the 12th July.

#### Who is eligible?

All students attending government primary, secondary or special schools in Victoria.

How can my child register for the program? Information about the program, along with initial consent forms covering oral health examinations and active preventive care, will be distributed through the school.

When and how will my child be seen? The Smile Squad team will first visit your school to undertake oral health examinations and active preventive care. Your child will be collected from class when they are due to be seen. After the initial check-up, an individualised treatment plan will be developed and sent home along with a secondary consent form for treatment if needed.

**Do I need to attend with my child?** You do not need to attend with your child. However, if you wish to, we can make an appointment time for you to attend together.

#### What does it cost?

Smile Sauad is a free program for all students. It includes an annual oral health check, active preventive care and follow up treatment if needed. Note: this program does not include orthodontic or cosmetic treatment.




