Late last week I had the privilege of listening to the Year 5's deliver their speech about their qualities and why they would like to be part of the leadership team. Their speeches showed a lot of flair and were of a very high standard. The year 4 and 5 students voted, and this formed the top 20. These students will be interviewed today, in front of four staff members. The ten successful students will be announced in a couple of weeks, after the Year 5 camp. It is really inspiring to listen to these young people and their desires to make a difference in their world.

Two weeks ago, on Sunday, we held the Out of Hours Music Program (OHMP) concert. The students who learn music throughout the year were able to showcase their talents in front of parents and friends. We also learned that Sid has taught guitar here for 19 years! We were then delighted to ask the Year 6 students to perform their piece at assembly last week in front of the school. I felt so proud of their courage and willingness to share their talents. Huge thanks go to the committee, Rebecca, Astrid and Joanna who organised the Sunday event and have supported the program throughout the year. Enrolments for next year's lessons are recommended, the form is available from the office.

The Year 5 Makers Market is on tomorrow. They have been working all term on developing their business plan, making the items and then tomorrow they will be selling. All classes will have a chance to visit the stall and make purchases. There is more information later in this newsletter. Once completed they will finish with a review of the process and any profits they make will be donated to a charity of their choice. It is an example of an integrated learning unit that involves 'real life' skill development and understanding. The students have been reading, writing, speaking and listening, completing many aspects of maths, learning about financial literacy and marketing, and developing their understanding of business. Well done to the Year 5 team for providing such an engaging unit.

As you know we will be holding a sausage sizzle, cake stall and coffee for the election on Saturday. We have asked for cake donations and volunteers for the day through Compass. Please contribute if you are able. I would like to thank School Council and especially Todd for his work in organising and co-ordinating this event.

Assistant Principal Update

Hello everyone,

Welcome to Term 4 Week 8.

The energy across the school is extremely high as the busyness of school ramps up. Year 5 Camp, P/1 Twilight Evening, Year 2 sleepover, incursions, excursions, swimming lessons, leadership interviews, transition, and the list goes on.

While it is exciting it does mean we need to continually be aware of the impacts this has on students' wellbeing and that of staff and ourselves. So, this week as we head full steam to the end of the year my goal is to take moments to be grateful and enjoy the experiences that are being afforded to us. I hope you can also find some moments throughout your week.

Yard & Playground Safety: This week we have seen an increase in the number of students in the Main Administration building during recess and lunchtime without permission and unsupervised. A lot of this is due to students going to First Aid, however on most occasions they have not first spoken with the yard duty teacher. We have communicated this to students, and I will speak about it on assembly this week. Can I ask families to also remind their children that if they require assistance when in the playground the best option is the yard duty teacher.

Primarily this is about ensuring students are supported safely throughout the school. For younger children, this is about learning the school processes to ensure they can feel safe and secure in the school environment.

APS Writers Festival and Art Show: Last Wednesday night's Writers Festival and Art Show was an amazing success. It was wonderful to see so many families enjoying the wonderful writing and art displays.

The scavenger hunts were again very popular and providing an engaging way for students and families to interact with the various displays. We will announce the winners on assembly this coming Friday.

A big thank you to all the students and teachers in preparing for the evening. A special mention to Christy for her efforts in coordinating the event.

2022 Planning: We are in the final stages of preparing classes for 2022. As we finalise the teachers, student classes and classrooms, staff will begin commencing the important job of planning for next year. Next week signifies the end of our specialist program for 2022 and in week 10 our teachers will be released to meet with myself and their 2023 teaching teams to plan their English, mathematics, and integrated inquiry programs of learning for the year. We have spent significant time this year developing our curriculum programs and have developed effective planning documentation which supports alignment to the Victorian Curriculum.

Furthermore, we will allocate time in the coming weeks for staff to meet, share and discuss student transition data. This will ensure that student's learning and wellbeing needs are known by their 2023 teachers, and that year level teams can begin planning differentiated teaching, learning and wellbeing programs to ensure students' needs are catered to at their individual point of need.


ELECTION BBQ: Volunteers & baked items needed
